## HEAT-RELATED ILLNESS: SYMPTOMS & FIRST AID

#### **Heat-Related Illness**

#### Signs & Symptoms

- A. Irritation, especially where skin is wet with sweat or clothing is tight. Can lead to infection.
- B. Headache, nausea, dizziness, weakness, thirst, and giddiness. Can lead to vomiting, and/or fainting. Victim has pale, clammy (moist) skin.
- C. Weakness; impaired motor skills; reduced ability to concentrate.
- D. A person suddenly faints. Happens when the brain doesn't get enough oxygen because the blood has pooled in the victim's arms or legs.
- E. Painful muscle spasms caused by salt imbalances in the body due to sweating.
- F. Victim has dry, pale skin (no sweating) or hot, red skin (looks like a sunburn) and is confused. Victim may have seizures and pass out.

#### First Aid

- G. Remove victim to a cool shaded area. Give water if the victim is alert and not nauseous. Don't leave the person alone. Cool the victim with a spray mist or wet cloth. If the person does not feel better in a few minutes, call for emergency help.
- H. Remove the victim to a cooler area to lie down during recovery. Do not give liquids to an unconscious person.
- I. Drinking carbohydrate-electrolyte replacement liquids may not eliminate the pain, but helps during recovery. Prevent by drinking a small cup of water every 15-20 minutes-even if you aren't thirsty.
- J. Take a short break in a cooler area. Pushing yourself to work through the condition can lead to a more serious illness.
- K. Return to cooler area. Wash and change clothing.
- L. Call for emergency help! Help the victim lie down in a cool shaded area. Don't leave the person alone. If the victim is alert and not nauseous, give water. Cool the person. Place ice packs under the arm pits and groin area.

# Generations on Line Offers <u>Free</u> Computer Instruction

The O'Neill Senior Center, the Morgan County Learning Center, the Belpre Senior Center, and the New Matamoras Library are now home to

Generations on Line, a web-based tutorial designed to teach seniors age 55 and older and disabled individuals basic Internet skills free of charge. Peer coaches who relate to seniors' needs provide personalized assistance with tutorial lessons that cover general familiarity with the keyboard and mouse, and Internet use. The program is part of a Digital Inclusion Initiative provided through Community Action and Senior Service America, Inc. The Planning & Development Department is pleased to announce that WMCAP has been awarded two Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grants (JAG) by the Office of Criminal Justice Services (OCJS). The grant awards were funded at \$150,000 each and will support the development of an offender reentry task force in Washington County and in Morgan-Noble (bi-county). The task forces will be charged with creating a five year strategic plan to reduce recidivism by 50%. (Recidivism = the tendency to relapse into a previous undesirable type of behavior, especially crime).

A profile of Ohio's offenders and correctional system:

- In 2004, 28,177 ex-offenders were released from Ohio's prisons. This is 6 times the number of prisoners released in 1980.
- Ohio has the 7th largest prison population in the country.
- One in 25 Ohio adults is in prison, on parole, or probation.
- The annual cost to house a single adult inmate in Ohio is \$24,875; for juvenile offender the cost climbs to \$110,000.
- Ohio spends \$1.6 billion a year on prisons.
- 80% of Ohio's inmates do not have a high school diploma or GED; 30% are functionally illiterate.
